JCHS to Receive Special Achievement Award from PA Museums for Stones N' Bones Exhibit



PA Museums' Special Institutional Achievement Award for the Stones N' Bones 3-Gallery Exhibit will be presented by Rusty Baker, PA Museums


Executive Director to JCHC Executive Director, Ken Burkett, at PA Museum's Annual Conference at Heinz History Center, Pittsburgh on April 20^{th,} 2020. PA Museums is a statewide trade association of museum professionals of both large and small museums.

Institutional Awards recognize outstanding projects that provide an exemplary contribution to the museum, public history, or cultural tourism fields in PA. A nomination may be made for any project/exhibit that raises the bar of excellence in any of these fields. Judging criteria considers new, innovative approaches, planning and implementing the exhibit at the highest level possible given staff size and budget limitations, and public engagement – drawing new and diverse visitors to the exhibit.

Other recipients are typically the larger museums, such as Heinz History Center and Children's Museum of Pittsburgh, and The Museum of the American Revolution, Philadelphia. This exhibit provides local accessibility to an exhibit you would have to travel to one of these large cities to see.

The 3-gallery exhibit opened November 2018 and incorporates Geology, Paleontology and the Ice Age of Jefferson County and western Pennsylvania. Our goal was to create an exciting, informative and interactive exhibit for all ages, but especially targeting elementary through middle school students by connecting with local teachers.

Brookville's Hickory Grove elementary school brought in 120 3rd and 4th graders one day to see the exhibit. Such excitement you've never seen nor heard! They had the most fun at our Ice Age dress -up Selfie Station, and were in awe of the Ice Age mega-mammals. Word of the exhibit spread, and we had requests from other schools, as well as scout groups, from outside of Jefferson County -

including Clarion, DuBois and Redbank Valley – that had never visited the History Center before, who now wanted to visit the Stones N' Bones exhibit.

PA Museums Special Achievement Award, continued:

The Man Behind the Mission

This exhibit is the brainchild of our Executive Director, Ken Burkett and could not have been possible without Ken's knowledge of geological processes, paleontology and archaeology. Ken is a Field Associate with Carnegie Museum of Natural History, Treasurer of the Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology (SPA) and long-time President of local North Fork Chapter 29, SPA. He is well known for his archaeological work and as a petroglyph expert. His life actually revolves around "stones and bones," hence the title of the exhibit.

This exhibit has been a year-long project in the physical sense, but for Ken, years in the making conceptually. In reality, this undertaking was a multi-year *MISSION*. His perseverance that someday an exhibit of this magnitude might be possible at our small museum—and his expertise in implementing it—made this exhibit possible.



Ken oversaw all aspects of the planning and development of the exhibit right down to the special "bone fonts" and borders for the panels used in the exhibit, the new exhibit cases and new platforms that were necessary, as well as finding the funding we needed. He identified what materials and items were needed and managed to obtain them. Ken also oversaw two CUP Geology and Geoscience interns, which we were fortunate to have, as well as staff, in researching and planning the Geology exhibit.

His connections with exhibit financial sponsors Billman Geologic (Pittsburgh), Rosebud Mining (Kittanning), Matson's Lumber & Insurance (Brookville) and Janney-Lerch Group (Clarion) made this exhibit possible.

His professional connections with the Red Hill Field Station & Fossil Museum (Clinton County) and Carnegie Museum were also crucial to completion of this exhibit. Many of the fossils and Indian artifacts and accoutrements are from his own collections and those of North Fork Chapter 29, and from Red Hill fossil site.

Ken has shown this community that the History Center has the capacity to showcase a "big city exhibit," albeit within the limitations of our small museum budget, staff size, and space limitations.

Visitors from other states tell us how surprised they are to see such an exhibit in our little town museum and how impressed they are by it. They want to know how we managed to put it all together. The answer to that question is simple: Ken Burkett's vision, historical knowledge, connections and perseverance.

My original nomination was for an Individual Special Achievement Award for Ken, but since he received both Institutional and Individual Awards for JCHC Scripture Rocks Heritage Park in 2017, PA Museums decided on giving JCHC an Institutional Award this year for the Stones N' Bones exhibit. (That year, 2017, we also received the American Association for State and Local History Award of Merit for the Park, a national award).

PA Museum's Rusty Baker stated: "The Awards Committee appreciates your hard work and how central you are to your organization, and they decided not to name you as an individual award winner because you were recently recognized with one. We hope you understand this decision does not diminish the outstanding work you and your organization are doing...Look forward to seeing you in April at the conference and awards." I think that says it all.

Either way, it is still Ken's achievement. We are fortunate to have in our small town a "big town museum," as well as the "Man Behind the Mission."

JCHS Receives PHMC Archives Grant

JCHS is the recent recipient of a competitive grant for Historic Archival Records Care from the PA Historical Museum Commission (PHMC). This grant will fund a professional archivist as a consultant for our photographic collections, as well as archival supplies necessary for the project. The project will begin May 1st and be carried out over two years time.



This grant is a collaborative effort between JCHS and Valerie Metzler, Professional Archivist from Altoona. Valerie will be training staff in proper archival records care and preservation and proficiency in using our museum software used to catalogue all of our collections. This project will help in the transition of curatorship from retiring curator, Carole Briggs, to JCHC staff.

Under a previous grant, Valerie assisted us in 2004, beginning the process of archiving part of our photo collection, the McMurray collection (1940-2005), consisting of original photos published in the Jeffersonian Democrat, Brookville American newspapers and related unpublished photographs. She will oversee the subsequent and final stages of this process with that collection, as well as with the Frederick Knapp collection—a photographic record of historic buildings, events, people and places of Brookville and Jefferson County covering 1898-1945—and the Cecil McCool collection of 20th century individuals , family groups and graduating BAHS classes covering 1945-1988.

The Knapp Collection includes 60+ three-foot long panoramas of reunions, Brookville's Civil War Grand Army of the Republic, and employees of many industries throughout the years and a famous photos of that momentous day in history in 1920 when women earned the right to vote.

After an initial visit to the archives and consultation with Valerie in July 2019, Executive Director Ken Burkett and Administrative Operations/Grantwriter Kat Lyons co-wrote the grant and submitted it in August 2019.

CUP Community Fellows Program Grant Award



JCHS received a small grant of \$500 in December from Clarion University toward the makeover of our Native American exhibit (see "Upcoming Exhibits"). This grant partners a CUP faculty or staff member with an area community or organization, and utilizes CUP students. Successful proposals demonstrate a contribution to communities served and contribute to the public service mission of the University.


Vic Stahlman, our 2019 summer intern, was our student of choice for this grant. Vic is majoring in Anthropology and Computer Science and is a senior undergraduate in the Honors Program. He is continuing to assist with the planning and implementation of our exhibit, researching new interpretive panels and working on exhibit layout. The award amount will help fund the 44" by 46" graphic panels which cost around \$300 each to be printed. Vic will give a presentation on this project at CUP's Academic Excellence Series in April.

First People: Native American Lifeways

We are redoing the exhibit panels to showcase Native American Lifeways in this region: How they gathered food, grew crops, traveled and traded, and interacted with European settlers. We are also adding a series of pull-out drawers holding projectile point typology where people can bring in their arrowheads and identify them by type and by age. In the window is our Paleo-Indian hunting with his wolf-dog, with atlatl in hand.

Also featured will be a new diorama (model) of Scripture Rocks Heritage Park Native American rock shelter and the artifacts excavated by North Fork Chapter 29 and JCHC staff and board. The diorama (right) was built by Ken Burkett using photos of the rock shelter before excavation.

We thank Billman Geologic, an oil and gas consulting firm in Pittsburgh, Clarion University of Pennsylvania Community Fellows Program Grant, and North Fork Chapter 29 for graciously funding this exhibit.

Map Exhibit YOU ARE HERE

The Grand Hall and Fetzer Skylight Gallery will showcase maps of western Pennsylvania and Jefferson County from pre-settlement times to present day. This exhibit was proposed by Arthur McKinley, Brookville native and collector of historical maps. We found his outlook for a map exhibit intriguing:

"Most interesting to me are the early Dutch, French and English copper engravings [maps] from the colonial period that are so often overlooked in Jefferson County history. Our area [of] Western PA comes slowly into focus on these early maps." ...the history of our area goes far before the story of the first white settler to a time when the land that is now Jefferson County was part of "New France."

"...different parties lay claim through maps to broad territories. We see not only the English and French laying claim to Western PA but also attempts to designate the entire area West of [the] Alleghenys for the Indians."

"Interestingly, the rugged and remote area that is now Jefferson County is one of the last blank areas to be filled in. Many of the mid to late 18th century maps only designate this unsettled area as "Buffalo Swamp" much as early navigators would demarcate unknown seas as *'here there be dragons*.' It would be interesting to explore how this particular designation came about and was perpetuated. Theories abound..."




