2103 Annual Giving Campaign

October marks the beginning of the Jefferson County Historical Society's Annual Giving Campaign with Dr. Dan Amsler serving as this year's Honorary Chairperson. Dan served as an officer and JCHS Board member during the years that the organization was in the midst of renovating the Nathan Green Edelblute Building and creating a modern main

street venue to showcase the county history. Dan notes that; "At the time, just as today, there were so many unknowns about funding the project, the feasibility of the renovation, and the sustainability of the organization once the project was completed. I am very proud of the fact that even today, during these times of virtually nonexistent government support for organizations such as ours, we have not only survived but actually thrive and play a central role in the county".

The two key reasons for this success have been a strong active board and staff as well as great supportive members such as you. The present board, just as in prior years, has dedicated members who work tirelessly to wisely manage the History Center's limited resources while carrying on the History Center's mission.



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American Towns At War

BROOKVILLE - The American Civil War divided the nation but also drew it together in unexpected ways. The Jefferson County Historical Society has recently partnered with Movie Emporium of Pittsburgh to tell the story of two small communities affected by the conflict.

"The United States at the time of the Civil War was not a nation of large cities but small towns and villages," said Ken Burkett, Executive Director of the JCHS in Brookville. "The war is often told through the eyes of combatants, leaders or through the prism of a large city like Philadelphia, New York or Chicago.

"We hear very little about these small towns although these communities supplied the majority of the participants for the war effort," said Burkett. "It is impossible to tell the story of all of these small communities so we have selected two, one in the north and one in the south, to speak for every small town and village."

The northern community is Brookville and the southern community is Falmouth, Virginia. "We have letters written by Brookville boys who camped at Falmouth," said Burkett. "The two communities were united during the war in an unexpected way."

"We selected Brookville because of the rich, documented, Civil War history," said Burkett. "From this rural area we had men serving in every major theater which had a dramatic impact on the people left at home. The Civil War home front is very much a story of a changing society and a major change for women. We also have a shift for Blacks in the area, freemen, who left their home to join the new "Colored Troops."

"The affect on Falmouth, caught on the wrong side of the Rappahannock River, was even more dramatic. This community was at one time a thriving river port sitting just opposite Fredericksburg," said Burkett. "Unfortunately for the people of Falmouth, it became the main campsite for the Union army from 1862 until the Spring campaign in 1864. The impact was catastrophic" said Burkett. "We have been working with people in Stafford County and local historians in Falmouth to tell the story on three levels: The pre-war community, occupation, emancipation of slaves

and the long term impact. It is a compelling story."

Currently location footage is being shot in Brookville, Falmouth, VA and at a recent Civil War battle re-enactment in Stroudsburg, OH. "We are excited about the project," said Russ Streiner of Movie Emporium of Pittsburgh. Streiner and John Russo have been teaching a film course at the DuBois Business College for the past several years and are writing and producing this production.

The immediate goal is a 15 minute trailer that will be also incorporated into a large hour-long documentary. Streiner said he hopes to market the finished film to a major television network. Initial funding for the trailer was provided by WalMart, a grant from the Jefferson County Hotel Tax Project and the Brookville Firemen's Club. The trailer will be used as a marketing tool to solicit additional funds needed to complete the project within the next calendar year.

Kate Scott: Did She or Didn't She?

In his book *Remembering Jefferson County*, Randon Bartley alludes to "a curious document" purportedly signed by historian Kate M. Scott. It is supposedly a sworn statement in which she claims to be the mother of a daughter fathered by none other than assassin John Wilkes Booth.

Here at the History Center opinions are divided about Kate Scott's claim. Some would say she did. After all, if you were an attractive young woman in your early twenties surrounded by uniformed young men, wouldn't you? On the other hand, others say she didn't. After all, the educated woman of the Victorian era was expected to adhere to a set of values that supported sexual repression, low tolerance of crime, and a strong social ethic.

But what about this "curious document"? Does the real thing actually exist in the collection of the Cunningham Memorial Library in Terre Haute, Indiana. Is the document available online truly a digital version of what Kate told the man named Osborn Oswald six months before she died "from suffocation from goiter and enlarged thyroid gland?" Or has someone gone to extreme measures to support the hoax that John Wilkes Booth was not killed after the assassination of Lincoln but escaped to India where he died in the 1880s?

Medical research about the thyroid gland was just beginning in the early 20th century. Goiter simply refers to the gland's enlargement. Among other symptoms, an enlarged thyroid gland causes fatigue, depression, constipation and problems with concentration. It causes breathing difficulties, cough, hoarseness, and difficulty in swallowing.

A tribute to Miss Kate M. Scott written after her death states that she "had been in failing health for more than year past, but her condition was not deemed serious until within a few weeks past, when a complication of diseases defied the skill of her attending physicians."

This raises the question, if Kate had been suffering from these symptoms for so long, would she have traveled to Washington, D. C. six months prior to her death?

Bartley states that the statement taken by Oldroyd "has been used in several published works but has been dismissed by mainstream historians." That is true. He adds, "The questions remain unanswered but certainly add another element to the story of Kate Scott."

Through a special grant funded by the Pennsylvania Humanities Council the JCHC is pleased to announce a special dramatic monologue depicting the Kate Scott controversy that will be performed for Jefferson County high school students and the public during 2014. At the Annual Dinner on Saturday evening, October 19th, JCHS members will be treated to the first enactment and have the opportunity to hear the evidence we've learned here at the History Center and decide for themselves, did she or didn't she? We hope to see you there.

"Power Within" by Julie Mader

A traveling Art Exhibit Focused on Cancer Fighting Plants inspired by the strength required of the patient, the medical team and those who love and support both sides.

Julie Mader is a talented self-taught artist from Smethport PA, who focuses on preserving regional and natural history thru her artwork. She is a juried member of the Pennsylvania Wilds artist program and her ten years of drafting experience prior to focusing on art are evident in the fine detail of her ink drawings and painting compositions.

Her concept for the "Power Within" exhibit began as a tickle of an idea many years ago when a neighbor was fighting cancer and she was witness to the incredible strength and support of family and friends. As years passed, she was frequently inspired by additional Cancer patients and their families and in 2012, with several solo art shows on her resume she felt that she had gained the experience needed to apply to the PA Council on the Arts for a Pennsylvania Partners in the Arts grant which would provide the funds needed to carry out the idea of a traveling show focused on cancer fighting plants. In 2012 she received notice that the project was funded and began work on this exciting endeavor.



In addition to providing a new approach to cancer awareness, this project is a way to honor friends, family members and all people living in the region who have con-

fronted Cancer in their lives. An additional purpose behind the exhibit is to expose residents of our rural region to original artwork.

We were saddened in July by the death of Joe Crossman Enterline of Brookville at the age of 92.

Earlier this year Joe was present a the History Center with members of his family for the installation and public reception of a temporary exhibit of a selection of his lifetime art works.

During WW II, Joe served in the 5th Air Force as a boatswain's mate on an 85 foot crash rescue boat in the South Pacific. After the war, he worked as an illustrator in Pittsburgh and later lived with his wife for the next 40 years at the family homestead near Coolspring before finally moving to St. Brookville for the remainder of their lives.

The Enterline Exhibit will remain on display through the end of 2013.

PROGRAMS

THE BIRD ON NELLY'S HAT! - This program *begins* with a wedding bonnet worn before the Civil War and ends with a wisp of veiling. Add a bit of poetry and a song and the audience will have fun and leave with a clearer recognition of the part women have played in our nation's history.

AN OLD-FASHIONED FELLER: CHARLES ALBERT BOWDISH - He delighted children and adults in Brookville for thirty-five years. His legacy has delighted millions more at the Carnegie Science Center in Pittsburgh where Bowdish's Miniature Village & Railroad[™] has grown into a huge layout that depicts Western Pennsylvania. Find out what motivated him in this PowerPoint presentation that can be adapted for audiences of all ages. If held at the History Center, our volunteers will run the trains after the program.

ALL THE TEA IN CHINA - You provide the setting and refreshments for a tea party and the History Center provides the entertainment with stories of tea time around the world and through the ages. Objects related to tea's preparation are described along with three examples from the History Center's collection of period clothing.

WHAT IS IT? WHAT DO I DO WITH IT? - Ask your club members to bring an object, a photograph, a letter something with a story. After sharing the stories and hearing one or two more about items in the History Center's collections, find out how to preserve them for future generations.

IF QUILTS COULD TALK - Three quilts from the History Center's collections provide the stories for this presentation. Who was Nora Brady and what does her crazy quilt tell us about her? Who were some of the folks that signed the Methodist Sunday School Quilt? When and where was the flower basket quilt stitched?

TO AND THROUGH JEFFERSON COUNTY: THE STORIES OF PEOPLE OF COLOR - Jefferson County is a rural county with a population that is 98% white, yet people of many shades have settled here or passed through. Meet these Native Americans, Black Americans, Japanese, and Middle Easterners in this 45-minute PowerPoint program.

A VIRTUAL VISIT TO THE JEFFERSON COUNTY HISTORY CENTER - Do your members have a hard time visiting Brookville's Historic District and the Jefferson County History Center? This virtual visit brings the History Center and its executive director or curator to you through a PowerPoint program that shows both permanent and temporary exhibits.

WILDCATS IN THE CIVIL WAR - Photographs and stories present the history of Brookville's famous 105th Pennsylvania "Wildcat" regiment during the American Civil War

SCRIPTURE ROCKS - Legends grow in part from facts and many versions abound about the numerous Scripture Rocks found throughout the woodlands surrounding Brookville, PA. This program will present an ongoing project initiated by the North Fork Chapter 29 of the Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology and the Jefferson County History Center as an effort to rediscover, formally record and interpret the Scripture Rocks and life of Douglas Stahlman during his personal "divine calling" the early 1900's.

NATIVE AMERICANS - Includes a series of programs on prehistoric cultures, petroglyphs and archaeology in this area of Pennsylvania

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
