





#### **Executive Director's Corner**

#### The Power of STUFF

One of the things I enjoy most in life is the almost a mystical experience of finding an arrowhead and realizing that I am the first person to touch it in the thousands of years since it was lost by a maker who could not possibly have envisioned what life would be like in the distant future. I have always appreciated how material items can link us to history in ways that books and other forms of media cannot accomplish.

Making my rounds through the museum, I am frequently drawn to objects that each have a unique history to tell. One of my favorites currently on display is the signature of Abraham Lincoln. When he penned this commission for Captain Sam Craig on 9/5/1863, it was just two short months after Gettysburg and the draft riots were just beginning. What were his thoughts on the sustainability and cost of lives for the war?

Another is the Klu Klux Klan robe worn by a Klansman here in Brookville. Most people don't know that between 1921 and 1928,t he Klan recruited over 250,000 men and women in Pennsylvania. This group provided a promise of shared fraternity, excitement, and civic improvement. The movement also fed on fear associated with an influx of foreign workers drawn to the booming coal mines, resulting in cheaper wages and lost jobs for local people. These new immigrants (many were our grandparents) were of different ethnicity and the surge of Catholics infuriated and caused fear among much of the traditional white Protestant population. Crosses were burned in Brookville and marches with thousands of participants in the surrounding communities took place. Sounds somewhat familiar to the rampant fears of immigration issues today—but we got past it then, and maybe by paying attention to a lesson learned — will again.




Cranking Up the Twyford

My grandfather (then in his mid-eighties) once told me that nothing resembled his life as a child growing up on a

country farm in Burkett Hollow. Electricity, running water, automobiles, airplanes, telephone, radio, television and every electrical appliance and gadget we cannot imagine living without today were all futuristic fantasies coming true to a child born in 1902.

Today my grandchildren cannot envision a time without space travel, cell phones or the war on terrorism. Recently a group of visiting 3<sup>rd</sup> graders were thrilled to type on an antique typewriter and tried to understand the concept of a dial telephone. A comment on seeing the black and white TV was that "video games must have been terrible." One boy wanted to know how the 1800s Brookville wagon was "hooked up" to a pickup truck. These are the important learning opportunities in a museum.



How's this thing work?

It is sometimes difficult to decide what current objects should be added to our collections. What will be important to future researchers and needed for exhibits to describe life in the early 21<sup>st</sup> century? How we preserve the past for the future is important, especially with so much digitization.

What would you consider are the top 10 artifacts that will help someone just 100 years from now understand what life was like in Jefferson County way back in 2019?

#### Scripture Rocks Heritage Park (SRHP) News

**Phase I** of the ADA accessible Native Plant & Wildlife Habitat project was completed in early summer by JCHC, CSU interns and kids from the Americorps Summer Program. The ADA area next to the pond and ADA trail from the parking lot was completed, and native plants selected and planted around the pond. The plants are all growing well and should bloom next spring, attracting beneficial pollinators. We can then begin our "citizen science" environmental program.



**PAGO Grant:** We just received a grant for a kiosk, two interpretive panels and plant signage for this ongoing project at the Park. The free-standing kiosk will hold information on the citizen science program, plant and wildlife identifiers and data sheets. The interpretive panels will describe plant-wildlife ecology. Plant signage will identify plant species. We thank PA Great Outdoors Visitors Bureau (PAGO) and grant approval from our County Commissioners for their support of our project.

The QCD allows IRA owners to make donations up to \$100,000 directly from their IRA to a charitable organization, such as the Jefferson County Historical Society, without paying taxes on that distribution.
