S. K Stephens Award

The Jefferson County History Center in Brookville, PA was the recipient of the Pennsylvania Federation of Museums and Historical Organizations **S. K. Stevens Memorial Award** for the Living on the Land Exhibit on Monday, April 2nd at the organization's 2012 Statewide Conference and Special Achievement Awards Luncheon in Carlisle, PA.

The S. K. Stevens Memorial Award was created in 1975 by the Historical Foundation of Pennsylvania to honor the memory of historian Sylvester Kirby

Stevens. This prestigious award recognizes outstanding accomplishments in the field of Pennsylvania state and local history. To qualify for this award an organization must have received both national and state recognition criteria which were met by the JCHC having received an Award of Merit from PA Museums for this exhibit in 2010 and an Award of Merit from the American Association of State and Local History in 2011. Included with the award is a \$500 cash prize.

This is the second time this organization has been the recipient of the Pennsylvania Federation of Museum's highest honor having also received the award in 2009 for the *Native American Lifeways in Western Pennsylvania* Exhibit.

ANF Projects

The JCHC board has recently accepted two contract projects in the Allegheny National Forest under our standing cooperative agreement which permits annual funding to be directed through the History Center for projects related to history and archaeology in the ANF.

The first project is the background research, development and installation of four interpretative signs related to the Tionesta Valley Railroad and railroad logging history of the Allegheny National Forest Area that will be placed at locations along the Spring Creek Horse Trail System. We will develop these signs in-house for installation later this fall.

The second project includes field mapping, background research and interpretation of the site of the Spring Creek Glass Sand Company. For this project the JCHC has subcontracted Quemahoning LLC, an archaeological survey company, to conduct the total station mapping and research while our staff will develop three additional historical interpretative signs to be installed at the site in 2013.

Over the past several years, the JCHC has successfully completed similar archaeological survey projects at the Arroyo Tannery, Robins Island and Salmon Creek sites for the Allegheny National Forest. Each of the contracts were subcontracted with oversight by the JCHC staff and board for which the society retains a management fee that is used to supplement our annual operating budget.



Bringing the past to the present is the goal of the Brookville Historic Signs Project currently being developed by the Jefferson County History Center in partnership with the Historic Brookville Inc., Brookville Chamber of Commerce and the Brookville Borough.


The Lumber Heritage Region and the Jefferson County Hotel Tax committee each provided \$5000.00. This fall twelve 18" x 24" panels will be installed at various locations along Main Street. Each panel will include early photographs and other information to provide a then-and-now view of the downtown National Historic District and assist visitors in interpreting the history of the community and its beginnings.

Visiting the History Center

Early this spring, I visited the Jefferson County History Center. It was almost nine years after leaving Brookville where I had lived and worked for 12 years.

When I left Brookville in 2003 to move to the West Coast, I had served on the board of the Jefferson County Historical Society for eight years. During that time our biggest focus was how to preserve more of Jefferson County's story and represent more of its

towns and citizens. To do that, we soon realized we needed a bigger, more prominent place to tell that story to the public. Almost miraculously, the beautiful, but grossly neglected Edelblute-Pearsall Building on Brookville's Main Street came up for emergency sale. (Well, it wasn't quite that easy. We spent many tense months negotiating with the previous owners, the city, and the county to save and buy the building.)

Once we owned the building, we had a huge challenge on our hands. First, to even keep it standing, our then board president Randy Bartley immediately hired a mason to shore up the rear wall which was all too obviously crumbling! Then we had to raise enough money to renovate the building and turn it into a space where the public could see our rich and growing collection. We had a relatively tiny budget, but using local talent (the architectural skills of Bill Snyder and the carpentry skills of Dave Fleming and Denny Popson), we managed to preserve the original rooms and most of the original trim and doors and recreate the beautiful original storefront, using a good photo from our archives.

And this is pretty much where things stood as I (very reluctantly) left Brookville in the spring of 2003. The exterior brick was painted, one storefront was completed, the other one well on its way, the electricity and plumbing were more or less in place, the interior walls and doors were mostly repaired, some of the interior painting was done. We hadn't moved anything into the building. The only exhibits were the building itself (a nice example of 19th century architecture) and a poster board in one of the storefront windows featuring a tiny bit of county history and a tinier bit of current county attractions. Proposals by professional exhibit designers described great exhibits with staggering price tags -- \$1 million and more. We had clearly accomplished a lot, but what remained to be done was more than daunting.

So imagine how I felt when visiting the History Center this spring. Entering through the store, I found a high quality collection of books, paintings, photos, and objects on Jefferson County and related subjects for sale – nothing of the kitsch that is so usual in the stores of museums both large and small.

And <u>then</u> crossing the hall into the large Parker Room, I really did stop breathing when I first took in the beautiful, carefully thought-out *Living on the Land* exhibit, with its fascinating Indian archeological finds, artifacts from pioneer times, and photos and models showing how people in Jefferson County made a living off the land by hunting, farming, logging the virgin forests, and drilling for natural gas. Bill McCracken's full scale re-creation of a Twyford car helps to tell the story of car manufacturing in Brookville. The narratives with the exhibits not only inform visitors, they <u>involve</u> them in thinking about history. At every opportunity, hands-on activities involve kids. This is truly a museum for people of all ages.

Upstairs in the hallway is an exhibit telling the history of the beautiful Edelblute Building itself, which is a good reflection of the development of Brookville's Main Street architecture and businesses. Just off the hallway in the front of the building is the spectacular Pearsall Parlor, an important part of the building's history. It was last renovated for the 1890 wedding of Adda Edelblute to Elmer Pearsall. Although a roof leak took a toll on the ceiling wallpaper and the original carpeting was beyond saving, the remaining wallpaper and the elaborate trim around the tall windows and doors still speak of the room's original magnificence. The furniture even includes a few pieces from the Edelblute-Pearsall family.



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Entering the next room behind the parlor, the visitor finds a thoughtful exhibit on Jefferson County's role in helping people escape slavery via the Underground Railroad. Narratives present available evidence and invite the visitor to draw conclusions, just as an historian or archeologist would. The room also includes the fascinating stories of some of the county's Asian- and African-American residents.

Across the hall is the beloved model railroad, named for Charles Bowdish, the man who created an elaborate model railroad in his Brookville home that drew thousands of visitors every Christmas from 1919 to 1955. This new model railroad was built by and continues to be cared for by ardent local volunteers. The county's historic buildings and land-scapes are re-created in miniature, and the collection of buildings includes a few made by Charles Bowdish himself.

And there is more. In a word, the Jefferson County History Center is so much more than we expect in a small rural county history museum. This telling of history is absolutely first class. I am not surprised that the center has won four state and two national awards. And it was all accomplished without professional exhibit designers, which is, I believe, one important reason for its success.

Like the renovation of the building, the exhibits were designed and built by local talent, including curator Carole Briggs, executive director Kenneth Burkett, interns from Clarion University, graphic designer Mandi Crain Stein, photographer Bill Stein, exhibit carpenter Jeff Carrier, and countless volunteers. They were able to create exhibits with a far deeper understanding of local history than any outside professional exhibit designer could have done.

The whole project, from the purchase and renovation of the building to the completion of the exhibits and the ongoing preservation of historical documents and artifacts, is a testament to what a community of people can accomplish if individuals work together, each contributing their labor, their particular expertise, and, above all, their hearts to make something that is bigger than any one of them alone.

The big challenge that still remains is to attract more visitors. You can do your

part by making your way to the History Center and by spreading the word to your family and friends. And whenever you have house guests, be sure to put this Jefferson County jewel on your sightseeing agenda. I guarantee you will learn something new every time you come. It is rich enough that you just can't take it in all at once. I, for one, even from my distant new home, plan to visit again and again.

New Exhibits The Civil War in Pennsylvania

The Heinz History Center in Pittsburgh presents *The Civil War in Pennsylvania* from September 29 through October 31st at the Jefferson County History Center.

- \Rightarrow Battle of Gettysburg




Featuring four life-like museum figures, plus Dog Jack, the exhibit includes curriculum materials that meet Pennsylvania and U.S. social studies standards, and other hands-on educational objects, such as replicas of historic items, for students to explore.



Strong Vincent - Born in Erie and a graduate of Harvard University, Strong Vincent was a young attorney when he enlisted in the Union Army in 1861. In the fierce battle on Little Round Top, Vincent rallied flagging troops with the phrase, "Don't give an inch!" A moment later, he was struck by a bullet and mortally wounded

Martin Delany - One of the first blacks admitted to Harvard Medical School, Delany, who lived in Pittsburgh most of his life, was a practicing physician as well as an ardent abolitionist. In 1863, Delany began

recruiting African American men as soldiers, many of whom joined the newly formed United States Colored Troops. Commissioned a major, Delany became the highest ranking African American in the Civil War.



Women and the War - Young women such as Tillie Pierce (pictured) and Allegheny Arsenal worker Kate McBride contributed mightily to the Civil War. When troops turned her hometown into a bloody battlefield Tillie hauled water, tore cloth into bandages, and


comforted the sick and dying. Kate McBride and other teenage girls toiled at the Arsenal making thousands of cartridges until the tragic day when an explosion killed more than 70 of them.

David G. Leach Rhododendron Exhibit

Jefferson County Pennsylvania Regional Historic Site Project

The Jefferson County Historical Society, Punxsutawney Area Historical and Genealogical Society, Brockway Area Historical Society, Reynoldsville Historical Society, Coolspring Power Museum and Charles E. Songer Historical group at the Fairgrounds have joined together to develop a county wide historic marker program that introduces notable people, places and events related to the county.



The planned markers are approximately the size of a standard highway speed limit sign and will display an outline of the county along with a numerical designation of the site number and a web site location where information may be obtained.

When installed, a guided driving tour brochure will be available for download online and will also be available for pickup at various locations across the county. The group hopes to have the first ten markers in place later this year with plans to add more annually.

Currently the group is seeking nominations from across the county for marker location designations. Anyone with a

suggestion for a Jefferson County Historic Site marker is encouraged to contact the JCHC or any of the participating organizations for and information packet and nomination form. For additional information contact the Jefferson County History Center.
