Awards and Programs

The JCHS was recently notified that we will be receiving an Award of Merit from the American Association for State and Local History for our *Living on the Land Exhibit*. Ken Burkett will be traveling in September to the AASLH annual museums and institutions conference in Richmond, VA to receive the award. This is the second time that the History Center has won this national recognition, the first being for the *Native American Lifeways* exhibit in 2008.

With the growing number of honors for exhibits that the JCHC has received over the past few years, Carole Briggs and Ken Burkett were recently invited to present a program titled *Building Small Exhibits on a Budget* to other regional museums staff at an affiliate partners conference held on May 20 at the Heinz History Center in Pittsburgh.

Carole Briggs also recently travelled to Philadelphia by invitation to participate in the National Endowment for the Humanities/Pennsylvania Humanities Council program evaluation process.

Exhibits

The History Centers newest exhibit *Journeys* is currently in the early stages of construction and installation with a planned opening this September in our upstairs Gallery B. Telling the story of Jefferson county's people of color, this exhibit will focus on the Underground Railroad, early colored settlers, civil war soldiers and the stories of people living here through the 20th century. This exhibit is being funded through supported by a Preserve America Grant from the National Park Service under the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission's Preserving African American Heritage in Pennsylvania Program.

We are still accepting ideas and offers of help for the development of our rhododendron garden in the rear area of the History Center. We hope to finish our design and begin construction later this summer.

On April 12th Randy Bartley and I had the opportunity to attend an official reception in the State Capitol where Governor Tom Corbett, Speaker of the House Sam Smith and other elected officials officially launched Pennsylvania's five year commemoration of the 150th Anniversary of the American Civil War.

Throughout Pennsylvania there is a long list of events, exhibitions and public programs that will tell the story of the 338,000 Pennsylvanians who fought and 33,000 that died in the conflict. Part of this long celebration includes the is the PA 150th Road show coming to Brookville during

the Jefferson County Fair as part of its state-wide tour over the next five years. I'm proud to announce that the JCHC was selected as one of six partner sites across the state to receive a \$5,000 grant as part of our collaboration with this project. These funds provide marketing, on-site programming by re-enactors and a *Read and Remember* project. We hope that you will visit us at the Road Show this summer at the Jefferson County Fair.

The JCHC along with the Punxsutawney Historical and Genealogical Society, Brockway Historical Society, Reynoldsville Historical Society, Coolspring Power Museum, Reynoldsville Historical Society, the Smicksburg Heritage Society and the Jefferson County Fairgrounds Museum have been meeting quarterly to work on joint projects and sharing information. This group is sponsoring the Coolspring Power Museum day on Saturday, August 16th for our members and guests. This is not a fund raising event and we hope you will join us for an exciting day visiting the award winning displays of working engines and a catered picnic lunch.

The Harrisburg bus trip is the first of our five year plan to visit locations relating to the Civil War and specifically the troops from Jefferson County. We thought Harrisburg would be the best place to start as most of the enlisted troops passed through Camp Curtain (where the National Civil War Museum now sits) on their way to the war. If you have never visited these museums you will be truly awed by the facilities and exhibits while enjoying an affordable and convenient way to visit. Reservations are first come and will fill fast so make yours early.

As a fall fund raiser we have reserved another bus to the Salamanca Casino and invite everyone to go along on this fun filled day to New York. After discount vouchers of \$25 for slots and \$10 for lunch the trip only costs \$15.

Looking ahead to December we are excited to announce that the *Wildcat Band* is coming to Brookville on December 3rd at the Jefferson County Court House. Playing authentic period instruments and music this group re-creates the band of the 105th Pennsylvania Volunteer Infantry. We are also working on possible dates for our annual Fieldstone Christmas venue.



PA 150 Road Show Coming to the Jefferson County Fair

Sponsored by the Jefferson County History Center the Road Show will be open at the County Fair on Thursday July 21 through Saturday July 23 The Road Show is an initiative of Pennsylvania Civil War 150, the state's official program commemorating the 150th anniversary of the Civil War (2011-2015).



The Road Show features hands-on, interactive displays to tell stories that will be engaging for the whole family. Inside the 1000 square foot trailer, four arcades exhibit artifacts and memorabilia are

mixed with high-tech displays, interactive exhibits and animated videos for visitors of all ages. From the original "3-D experience" of stereoscopes, to the voices of individual Pennsylvanians, to the scenes of camp and home life, visitors will be immersed in a new understanding of how America's greatest crisis changed the lives of Pennsylvanians.

Visitors are invited to share their own Civil War-era family photographs, artifacts and

other material and stories in a special recording booth. These are then uploaded to the Pennsylvania Civil War 150 website, a public repository that grows as the Road Show travels the Commonwealth and can also be viewed at www.PACivilWar150.com



In another area, visitors can take a Civil War-era souvenir self-portrait and upload it to their email address.

A special exhibit case near the exit of the road show will display local historical Civil War artifact from the JCHS collections.

In addition to the exhibits inside the show, numerous short programs will be also be presented various civil war period re-enactors which include visits from members of the 105th Pennsylvania Volunteers, Berdans Sharpshooters, a Civil War Surgeon, the Sanitary Fair Commission and Abraham Lincoln..

The Pennsylvania Civil War Road Show is an initiative of Pennsylvania Civil War 150, the state's official program commemorating the 150th anniversary of the Civil War, 2011-2015 and is governed by a statewide alliance of history, heritage, arts and culture

organizations, that include the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission (PHMC), the Pennsylvania Heritage Society (PHS), the Senator John Heinz History Center and the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, along with a number of partner organizations across the state.

Volunteers Needed

We need to help run the Road Show on Thursday, Friday and Saturday July 21–23 from noon until 8:30 pm and are seeking volunteers age 18 years or older who will help as staff within the Road Show exhibit which can accommodate up to 40 visitors at a time. The volunteer jobs center on answering visitors questions about event activities inside and outside the trailer, assisting visitors as needed and help-ing maintain a pleasant experience for everyone at all times.

At last one person is needed daily to function as the Story Booth technician assisting guests create a digital recording of their family stories or documenting an artifact they have brought with them. This person needs to be computer savvy. crowd control. Others are needed to help with sales and in the membership tent.

The exhibit will be open 8 hours daily but volunteer shifts can be broken into staggered or partial shifts. A short training session is required each day. Volunteers are required to wear brown khaki pants and a PA 150 Staff T-shirt will be given to each. 

The book is a fictional account of what happened to the father of *Little Women*, a beloved book written by Louisa May Alcott. In her Pulitzer prize-winning book, Brooks created the fictional world of Mr. March's experiences during the Civil War. He is in the South during the war, a war Brooks describes as brutal.

Curator's Corner

Even though its title is *Drumbeat to War*, the creation of our latest exhibit was for me more like a symphony than a march. A march is associated with trumpets and drums, with pageantry and processions. A symphony, on the other hand, is the development of a theme over three or four movements, each with particular characteristics.

Like a symphony, the creation of *Drumbeat to War* was spread over three or four movements, each with their own characteristics.


The first movement of a symphony includes exposition, development, and recapitulation. In other words the idea, its development, and finally, a summary. We knew at the History Center that we wanted to explore how the Civil War impacted our county during the five year commemoration that is taking place on a national level between 2011 and 2015.

We developed an overall plan, then a specific plan for depicting 1861. We summarized it by saying we would show what life was like prior to the war, the immediate reaction to Lincoln's call for troops, their camp life, the realization the war would not be brief, and finally the formation of the 105th Pennsylvania Volunteers or, as commonly known, the Pennsylvania Wildcats.

The second movement of a symphony is usually slower. Once we determined our idea or theme, we took time and looked for the objects, documents, and images that would show the change from the excitement and perception that the fight would be quickly concluded to the realization that it would take longer.

The strong rhythms of our symphony's third movement began in February. The theme was established and developed. We had identified objects, documents, and images. Now it began to come together. Like the string section, local reenactors came forth with camp objects and uniforms. The storyline needed revision and graduate assistant Nathan Pearce went to work on the theme much as an oboe and bassoon repeat and vary a theme in a symphony. The rhythmic beat continued when Bill McCracken brought in a much-needed wooden barrel and images of the wildcat on the 105th Gettysburg monument arrived via the Internet.

Now it was time for the fourth movement — all parts working together toward a grand finale. Here at the History Center we have a good time making music! We hope our visitors will enjoy our symphony titled *Drumbeat to War*.

Preparations are underway for the 6th annual Antique firearms and Indian Artifact Show to be held on Saturday, September 3rd at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds.



The show annually features some of the finest flintlock and percussion rifles and other accouterments made by local 19th century gunsmiths and is always a great opportunity to talk to knowledgeable collectors and vendors, check out the antique firearms or possibly become the new owner of one of the rifles once carried by the first set-

tlers in this area.

The Northfork Chapter 29 of the Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology will also be exhibiting both prehistoric and historic Indian artifacts in an adjoining building. Most of

these collections are local and often include artifacts as old as 10,000 years created by this areas earliest hunters.

A special Atlatl area will be set up nearby so young and old can try their hand at this ancient way of throwing hunting spears.
