PHMC Marker Dedication

The Pennsylvania Historical & Museum Commission and the Jefferson County Historical Society will be conducting a Pennsylvania Historical Marker dedication ceremony on Monday, June 15, 2009 to commemorate Brookville's Pioneer Aviator, Lewis Earle Sandt (1888-1913).

Lewis Earle Sandt grew up in Brookville where he rode a motorcycle and had the first car in town. He was about twenty when he and his brother Walter moved to Erie and opened the Star Garage, a bicycle repair shop. He learned to fly, bought a plane and participated in many early aviation endeavors and activities. On February 20, 1912, Sandt became the first United States citizen to fly an international flight when he flew from Erie to Long Point, Canada, then returned and crash-landed about 10 miles from North East on the ice covered lake. During an exhibition flight over Grove City on June 12, 1913, Sandt's plane crashed into a field. He was taken to the hospital and subsequently died 10 days later from lock Jaw (tetanus).

The Coolspring Power Museum contains the largest collection of historically signifi-

cant, early stationary gas engines in the country. With the exception of a few items in the collection that were driven by the engines, such as compressors, pumps, and generators, and a few steam and hot air engines shown for comparison purposes, the collection contains only stationary internal combustion engines.

It's hard to believe that a full year has passed since coming onboard as Director of the JCHC. The increase in staff which

History Center Planning for Richardsville Community Days



Student Historic Preservation Workshop



Students from Triangle Tech, Dubois, spent a morning in Brookville recently learning about historic preservation. Curator Carole Briggs explained the preservation of the Nathan Green Edelblute Building and its adaptation as the new Jefferson County History Center prior to their Main Street tour where Means & Lauf Super Drug owner Dave Smith described his efforts to build a new building that fits into the late 19th century architecture. Finally, clerk of the works John Hegburg guided the group through the Jefferson County Court-

house where major preservation and adaptations are underway.

Exhibit Items Needed

Curator's Corner Carole A. Briggs, Curator



Changes

When the historical society began in 1967, members and friends began to donate objects, photographs, and documents that would help interpret the lives of the people here. By 1971, the board had purchased the building on Jefferson Street. They fancied up the parlor to look like a 19th century parlor, installed the old school board directors' table in the library, and then the rooms and nooks and crannies became home to the things of our collective history.

Somewhere along the line several Clarion students typed 3"x 5" cards describing some of the holdings. There was no accession book. There was no computer database.

When this curator arrived in 1989, the basement was stacked with newspapers. The closets were filled with old account books. Exhibit cases that had been donated were crammed full. In one we discovered the wooden hands to the old courthouse clock that Arthur Altman had retrieved from the Historical Society of Western Pennsylvania!

That year, Green Thumb worker Sally Waite and I literally laid out everything on the floors of the second floor and began to catalog what the collections contained. At the same time, the board decided we needed more room, and a bequest from Margaret Johnson made possible the building of the Margaret Johnson Archives Building. We purchased shelving and organized them to hold the artifacts or objects, manuscripts, and records that continued to accumulate.

Through a Link-to-Learn grant we purchased our first computer and developed a catalog system. Later we learned about PastPerfect Museum software, purchased it, and re-entered what had been done first on 3x5" cards, and then entered into our first computer.

Today we use the latest edition of PastPerfect and are refining our collections policy. Obviously, we cannot collect everything! Here are the steps we take:

- A. When a potential donor phones, Emails, or brings in a potential donation, the first question asked is "How does it relate to our county's history?"
- B. If it does, temporary accession information is recorded, including whether the donor would like it re turned or whether the board may decide what to do with it. The potential donor and the curator receive copies.
- C. At the next board meeting, the curator recommends whether the potential donation should be added to the collection, returned to the donor, transferred to another museum, used for education purposes, or sold in the shop or at auction.

Following the board meeting, the curator does the appropriate paper work as instructed by the board: mailing Deeds of Gift to be signed by the donor if the item is accessioned or phoning the donor that the item should be picked up.

Sometimes potential donors do not want to be bothered with the official Deed of Gift. In that instance, we suggest they use Anonymous, but provide us with contact information in the event we have questions about the item. This eliminates paperwork for both the potential donor and the curator.

Sometimes we request the loan of items for exhibit purposes. In this instance, a Loan Agreement is signed by both the curator and the loaner. The loanee may be another museum or an individual. Ordinarily, we do not take items on loan unless we have made the request.

Careful record-keeping is a responsibility of any history center. Here at the Jefferson County History Center we continue to improve our system and are grateful for those donors who help us do so. If you have objects to loan or donate, do not go home without the appropriate form!

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Gun Show

The 4th Annual Antique Firearms & Indian Artifacts Show opens at 9:00 am on Saturday morning, August 22nd at the Jefferson County Fairgrounds, and will run until 4:00 pm.

This 2-building event features antique firearms and accouterments dating prior to and until 1898 It will include a combination of exhibitors and vendors with guns, accessories and items of related interest for both show and sale. Period style modern gun makers and other sutlers will also be present with examples of their related crafts, books and collecting supplies.

In addition to the gun show, the History Center has again teamed with the North Fork Chapter #29, Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology, which will present an exten-

sive display of prehistoric and historic Native American artifacts. Other activities include flint-knapping demonstrations, artifact identification for the public and an open atlatl competition. An atlatl, for those who aren't familiar with the term, is a spear-throwing device used to propel a spear with much more force than can be generated by arm-throwing alone. The competition will be held in a field adjacent to the exhibit buildings. People new to the Atlatl are also invited to try their hand in a non-competitive learning experience.

Nationally-Recognized Gun Maker Recreates Jefferson County History



Mr. Ron Luckenbill, has again been commissioned by the JCHC to create a reproduction of late percussion period rifle built by local gunsmith Abraham Burkett. The original Burkett rifle - which is featured on page 135 in Longrifles of Pennsylvania: Jefferson, Clarion and Elk Counties, Russell Harriger's comprehensive book on regional gunsmiths is a short barrel .36 caliber hunting and target rifle. When Luckenbill created his reproduction of this unique rifle, which features a "Brookville eye" inlay on both the cheek piece and the opposing side wrist, he stayed very close to the original design, but opted for a larger caliber that would make it legal for hunting use. The result is a very accurate reproduction that captures the graceful lines and excellent balance of the original. The reproduction is finished with a beautiful curly maple stock and a .50 caliber barrel. Mr. Luckenbill is an excellent craftsman, and a feature article

about his work appeared in the February Issue of Muzzle Blasts, the monthly publication serving the membership of the National Muzzle Loading Rifle Association.

In addition to the rifle, which is the Grand Prize in the raffle drawing, the Historical Society will also be giving away four other prizes. Second prize is a handcrafted tomahawk also built by Mr. Luckenbill that features an engraved brass pipe head and an inlayed curly maple shaft. Third prize is a custom muzzleloader's shooting box. Fourth prize is a signed copy of "Longrifles of Pennsylvania: Jefferson, Clarion and Elk Counties." Fifth prize is a Hoppe's Universal Gun Cleaning kit.
