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JCHS Receives Award

An Award of Merit was presented to JCHS Executive Director Ken Burkett and Curator Carole Brigs by the Pennsylvania Federation of Museums and Historical Organizations at the Special Achievement Awards reception held on November 8, 2010 in Williamsport.

Presented for the Living on the Land exhibit completed in 2009, the Jefferson County Historical Society is cited as having employed the established best practices of larger, better-funded museums during the development of this project. First and foremost, they tailored their goals to fit their mission, conducted numerous focus groups to determine the public's interest and mounting temporary teaser exhibits that provided data to make a stronger case

statement for Institute of Library and Museum Services and Lumber Heritage Region grant funding which was ultimately

received. Relationships forged in the development stages of the project allowed them to find the matching funds right in their own community. They employed the skills of their own volunteers and staff to build exhibit elements and to develop educational materials based on the state educational standards. Their collaboration with larger institutions augmented local expertise and an evaluation plan is in place based on audience feedback to provide input for future improvements.

Brookville can boast a stronger community resource in the Jefferson County Historical Society while the organization realized increased professionalism, experience and institutional capacity that will be used in the development of future exhibits and projects.

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Exhibits

History Center Plans Civil War Commemoration

This year, the Jefferson County History Center joins museums throughout the country to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the Civil War.

Executive Director Ken Burkett was enthusiastic when announcing the plans, "We're excited about this five-year long commemoration and are pleased it includes special exhibits, events, and programs for visitors of all ages. Two exhibits are in the works right now."

Opening in March 2011, *Drumbeat to War* presents the excitement and expectations of 1861. Opening in September, *Journeys* chronicles the travels to and through the county of people of color, and features a miniature of one of Brookville's four Underground Railroad sites.

Five other exhibits: photographs of Jefferson County soldiers from the Ron Palm Museum of Civil War Images in Gettysburg; the 105th Pennsylvania Volunteers or "Wildcats;" one titled the *Cost of War;* an exploration of Kate Scott and her roles as nurse, author, and possible paramour of John Wilkes Booth; and *Reunions and Remembrance,* an exhibit that will look at the post-war activities of Grand Army of the Republic; are planned for 2011-2015.

Burkett adds, "The highlight of this five-year commemoration will be two exhibits created by the Heinz History Center in Pittsburgh. We are one of the first organizations in Pennsylvania to have their 53-foot trailer exhibit. It will be at the Jefferson County Fair in July. The following year we will host their Civil War exhibit. We certainly hope teachers will make students aware of this summer's exhibit at the fairgrounds and plan now to bring their students to the History Center in October of 2012."

And if those exhibits and programs are not enough, the History Center has plans for other programs and bus trips. Reenactors, the 105h Wildcat Band from Indiana County, a reunion of Civil War descendants, Civil War related walking tours, and programs for young people are all part of the commemoration.

Plans are underway now for this summer's bus trip to the National Civil War and State museums in Harrisburg. Other trips to the Fredericksburg Wilderness area battlefields of Virginia, to Gettysburg, and to the Richmond/Petersburg battlefields will follow.

How can you help? Curator Carole Briggs says, "Now's the time to let us photocopy those letters in the attic and that framed document on the wall, and to discuss the loan of that stuff in the trunk in the corner. Curator's Corner

In early December we were up to our ears in hoops, crinolines, petticoats, bloomers, and bustles as we prepared for a most successful Victorian Fashion Show at the Jefferson County Courthouse. The event was a wonderful opportunity to show off the period costumes created by Louisa Striver of Oil City.

Louisa has enjoyed designing and sewing costumes for many years. When her collection became too large in 2004, she began to look for a home for them as well as many original pieces she'd collected. Some museums were only interested in the originals. However, with our annual Victorian Christmas celebration going strong, we felt Brookville and Jefferson County could make good use of the costumes. And we have!

Models wore more than thirty-five costumes created by Louisa on December 4th, and underneath they wore a variety of undergarments. Fortunately for the models, Louisa has sized them for today's larger woman and made many of the waists with elastic waistbands. Nevertheless, we requested minimalist undergarments to create typical 19th century silhouettes.

The long petticoat or full-length slip was a necessary undergarment for the early Jane Austen-type gowns worn prior to the Civil War. These dresses were often made of very filmy see-through fabrics.

By the 1830s women were tiring of the empire-waist vertical gown and the waistline migrated to its more normal position.

Skirts increased in size and the silhouette became bell-shaped. Underneath the fuller skirt, women donned one petticoat, then two, three, and more. In fact, some sources quote the numbers eight and ten! Hems were reinforced with horizontal bands of cording, tucking, or both.

By 1850, seamstresses were adding rows of flounces to the skirts on the outside and bands of

horsehair crinoline to the inside. The horsehair crinoline reinforced the petticoats, too. Shortly before the Civil War, the caged crinoline appeared. At first, whalebone hoops were suspended from the waist by fabric tapes. Later spring steel replaced the whalebone and the stiff crinoline was replaced with fabric.

Original hoops at the History Center include an oval one that is 33 inches wide and 43 inches from front to back. Twenty-three thin wire hoops are suspended on nine canvas tapes. The other is not quite as oval and measures 20 by 23 inches. It is built of seven wires on canvas bands, but the reason I'm fond of it is its source. My neighbor, Dorothy Park, donated it so I know it was probably worn by one of the Austin women around 1870.

That's when the winds of fashion changed again and hoops became oval in shape, only to be replaced by the small bustle. While we do have original hoops, we do not have any original bustles so if you find a strange rat-infested bit of wire and fabric in your attic, bring it in — you may have located a bustle!
