Message from the President **Eric Armstrong**

2015 is going to be an exciting year for our historical society. We are adding a Military Show on March 28 that will feature arms and accoutrements from the Civil War period up to WWII. We're hoping that this will appeal to military collectors and those interested in military history and become an annual event. We will continue with the Gun and Artifact Show (10th year), which we will share with the North Fork PA Archaeology Society on Labor Day weekend.



We are also planning several trips during 2015, which we started with a day at the PA Farm Show. Watch the local paper and JCHS web site and Facebook for further information. A list of our 2015 events is included in this newsletter.

A major goal for the coming year is opening the Scripture Rocks Park at the Port Barnett site, north of Brookville. We believe that a July 2015 opening is possible if we can get enough volunteer help from the membership and the community, as well as financial contributions to complete the project. Needless to say, the Scripture Rocks are unique, and will attract many visitors once the park is open and Douglas Stahlman's story is more widely known.

Knapp was born and raised here in Brookville, and he worked for a short time at masonry. However, he was quickly taken by the creative essence of photography and studied as an apprentice under E.C. Hall, another photographer of the Brookville area. Knapp later attended school in Pittsburgh where he formally studied photography and




upon his return he bought Vasbinder's studio on Main Street and relished life capturing and interpreting the lives of many county residents.

Brookville's Practical Gunsmiths

The muzzle loading rifle trade that developed in Jefferson County during the second half of the 19th century had a flavor of simplicity and style unique to this area. Largely in a wilderness environment, the rifles made here were working guns most often made without the fancy frills and embellishments of some of the eastern markets. These rifles were made to




be used, and they were a key item in every household to control varmints, put meat on the table, stand in the militia, provide protection, and frequently participate in community marksmanship competitions. The Jefferson County gunsmiths were proud of their trade and a number of them used a special easily identifiable silver emblem on their

rifles known as the Brookville Eye.

Rifle making was usually not the only business conducted in these shops. Most also functioned as blacksmiths, or creative luthiers or woodworkers making violins, inlaid furniture, art, and other unique sellable crafts

The newest JCHS exhibit - *Brookville's Practical Gunsmiths* highlights the stories of some of Brookville's little known gunsmiths including Anthony Bonnett (right) who made rifles but also created violins and inlaid furniture and also dabbling in art and photography,



Uncle Billy McCullough served in the Civil War with the elite Berdan's Sharpshooters and probably made more rifles than anyone in the county.

Daniel Long made rifles but is also well known for his unique style of violins.

Curator's Corner

SHOES

I had the privilege of knowing Verna Leith, the driving force behind the Sawmill Centre for the Arts. It was Verna who thought Cook Forest needed such a place, and it was Verna who traveled to Harrisburg to find funding for it. And it was Verna who gave me this advice, "When you have created something like the Sawmill, it's important to find those folks who will fill your shoes after you are gone." Verna did and today, many years later, thousands of folks attend the plays, participate in workshops, purchase items in the gift shop, and enjoy the wonderful place she envisioned.



Since 1989 I've had the pleasure of being a part of the growth of the Jefferson County Historical & Genealogical Society as it grew into the award-winning Jefferson County History Center. Many folks have stepped up to keep the institution growing— our board members, volunteers, and interns willingly give of their time, talents, and treasures. However, there are some empty shoes we need to fill!

Our Bowdish Volunteers are looking for those model railroad buffs who are interested in keeping the layout fresh and interesting. Now is the time for those with an interest in train repair, the electrical system, or building new miniatures to pair up with the old pros—to try on their "shoes!"

Our History Center education program is growing. This past October we presented a program to Pinecreek second graders, hosted a full day of Hands-On-History for 160 fourth graders, and co-operated with CREATE on a one-day program for 160 sixth graders. In May we will host our Hands-On-History program for Hickory Grove third graders—an opportunity for volunteers to try on the History Center education "shoes."

In 1993, board member Kay Taylor organized an oral history project. She felt it important to interview and record the stories of thirteen of Brookville's oldest citizens. Today those tapes are invaluable. In one interview, Pete Reilly and Mary Dick recalled watching Earle Sandt take off on his pioneer flight to Punxsutawney. In the intervening years we have interviewed folks about going to school and what it is like to be a person of color. Ron Ramolt has done a superior job of interviewing and videotaping veterans who served in World War II. Now it is time to seek out the stories of the 1950s and 1960s. What happened to people here in the postwar years? We need some folks to try on some interviewer "shoes."

Finally, we use padded hangers to store much of our textile collection, and are looking for a person or two who enjoys simple sewing to make these padded hangers at home. We, of course, will provide the materials and directions. If you are ready for a new pair of "shoes," contact the History Center and let us know your size and style! We'll be happy to show you what we have to offer and find the perfect fit for you, whether it be railroad "shoes," education "shoes," interview "shoes," or "sewing" shoes!


Meadowcroft Rockshelter and Historic Village Saturday, June 27th

Discovered when landowner Albert Miller found stone artifacts in a groundhog burrow Meadowcroft Rockshelter is now one of the most important sites in the US. Dr. James M. Adovasio led the first excavations of the site beginning in 1973 through the University of Pittsburgh, and his methods of excavation have made this one of the

most carefully excavated sites in North America.

Radiocarbon dating of the site indicated occupancy beginning 16,000 years ago and possibly as early as 19,000 years ago indicating that the site was used in the pre-Clovis era, and provides evidence that makes it one the oldest known human habitations in North America.

The site was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1978. In 1983, the Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission installed a historical marker noting the historic importance of the site, and in 2005 it was designated a National Historic Landmark.

Western Pennsylvania during the 18th century, the old world and new collided on the frontier as Europeans and Africans encountered the native Lenapes, Shawnees, and Iroquoian-speaking Mingoes. The often violent frontier became a cultural mixing ground. American Indians traded furs and deerskins for a wide variety of European goods. Backcountry settlers in turn adopted native food crops, articles of clothing, and forest survival skills. Despite their many cultural differences, Indians and Europeans shared a common, vital need for the land and its natural resources. At the 1770s frontier trading post, you can visit a trading shelter typical of the first few years of European settlement in Western Pennsylvania and learn about the many challenges both Native people and European settlers faced as these cultures came together.

Other activities at the Meadowcroft complex include a recreated Upper Ohio Valley Village where visitors can interact with various re-enactors and enjoy living history demonstrations designed to show how Western Pennsylvanians once lived. Get educated with a lesson in a one-room schoolhouse, experience a reassembled 1870s log church or watch a blacksmith forge red-hot iron.





Smithsonian Magazine recently named Meadowcroft as "One of the Five Great Places to see Evidence of the First Americans"

Meadowcroft's recreated Monongahela Indian Village gives visitors a close look at the everyday lives of 16th century American Indians. Explore the interior of a wigwam, inspect carefully recreated prehistoric artifacts, and learn about American Indian agriculture. Enjoy the traditional Three Sisters Garden and a hunting camp filled with furs, hunting tools, and fishing equipment.

One of the most popular activities at Meadowcroft's Indian Village, visitors can try their hand at using an atlatl, a prehistoric spear thrower used by American Indians for hunting fish, waterfowl, and mammals.
