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A Message From the President

As 2017 begins we welcome our new board members, Randy Bartley, Amy Salsgiver, Vickie Storey, Jamie Popson and Jessica Weible, to complement our existing group and replace some dedicated people who have finished their terms of service. We have some great plans for them and the rest of the board to assist with new programs, events and exhibits.



Last year we opened Scripture Rocks Heritage Park which has, over a six-month period, welcomed more than 9,000 visitors. This spring we will have a pavilion completed in the picnic grove area. The pavilion will be available for civic events, group tours, reunions and family events. We will also have the archaeological excavation of the Indian Rock Shelters complete, and will open this area for visitors.

We are planning several wonderful upcoming exhibits at the JCHC including a 3-gallery display honoring the history of the Jefferson County Fire Departments from 1890 to the present along with educational displays for both kids and adults about fire safety. Others are an exciting photography display by Joan Swigert and a special gallery acknowledging our past 50 years as the County Historical Society.

We will also continue our 3rd annual Military Collectibles Show and in the fall the Antique Rifles and Indian Artifact Show and are planning some new ideas to make these venues even more attractive to exhibitors and visitors. Our very popular Escape Room will re-open this spring with an all new (and more diabolical) puzzle.

We are introducing quarterly membership meetings this year to engage the membership in the society's activities, report on progress and solicit ideas. We will include a program at each of these meetings, which will be open to all members and guests. We have plans for other new events, which will be announced in future newsletters.

Jefferson County is the epitome of "small town America", We have architectural, physical, and social ingredients that are unique, timeless, and worth preserving and communicating. To help accomplish this we are favored with an active and dedicated Staff and Board of Directors. We also rely on the continual support of the community and our extended families who are scattered across the country, but holding fond memories of their home towns.

I invite you to stop in and enjoy the Jefferson County History Center or hike the Scripture Rocks Heritage Park during 2017 and let us know how you enjoy them.

50th Anniversary: The Past: The First 30-some Years

Although the first Jefferson County Historical Society was chartered prior to 1930 (the George W. Heber Historical Society), a new Jefferson County Historical & Genealogical Society (JCHGS) was formed in 1967 by a core group, including William "Daisy" Gilbert , Arthur Altman and

Robert Philliber who all served as president at one time.

The first organizational meeting of 50 residents was at the Reynoldsville Borough building, Jan 24th 1967. Committees were formed from members from Brockway, Brookville, Reynoldsville, and Punxsutawney. On February 28th, a board of directors and by-laws were approved. Robert Philliber, a Punxsutawney history teacher was elected the first president with William "Daisy" Gilbert as vice-president. The annual fee was set at \$2 per year! Life memberships were \$100.

At their first spring meeting, Douglas Stahlman's "Rock Book" was a highlight.

Funny how things have come full circle today with Stahlman's rocks! Meetings were held at various venues in the county, and featured guest lecturers and "show and tell," where members brought in relics they could share or donate for their future museum. In 1969, JCHGS dinner tickets cost just \$2.75!

1971 was an exciting and busy year. A newspaper headline read "Society Needs Help." With just 94 members, Arthur Altman appealed to county residents for a membership of 200 to qualify for County Commissioner funds. He also mailed 2000 citizens "with roots in Jefferson County to join for \$1.00" and that's exactly what happened. That is some salesmanship!

The search for a building was on and by summer 210 new memberships secured \$2000 to purchase the Brady Craig building at 236 Jefferson St. The deed was dated July 2nd and they then applied for a charter at the Courthouse. The first meeting at Brady Craig Museum was July 27th. Now the real work began, as the society's new pre-Civil War home needed serious repairs.

A building committee formed to plan the restoration. By March 1972, furnishings and artifacts had been collected from the Paul Darling Memorial Hall and a big new museum sign erected—but still no heat! More repairs included demolishing a room, replacing the roof, installing wall furnaces, and new steps to be built. Reproductions of the 1866 Pomeroy Map were sold to help fund repairs. Dues were still \$2.00.

Spring 1973, membership was at an all-time high. The Society reprinted the Kate Scott 1888 *History of Jefferson County*, priced at \$16.50 and paid off the mortgage and redecorate rooms, including a Victorian parlor dubbed The Kate Scott Room, where you felt as though you passed through a time portal to a more elegant age.

1974 brought major remodeling, so the museum had limited hours, especially in winter due to heating expense. The Society reprinted the rare 1878 *Caldwell A tlas*, which sold for \$15. Cost of a dinner ticket was then a whopping \$10.00.

In 1975, there were 244 members and annual dues were still at \$2.00. Glenn Shaffer of Pansy roots was the first Life Member at 97 years young! The newly renovated D.A.R room opened with 150 genealogical books collected by the late Mrs. Walter Sandt, including colonial records, and PA archive materials. A 2nd reprinting of the Kate Scott history and *Caldwell Atlas, Builders of a County Seat* and the popular McKnight histories were sold.

Bi-Centennial plans moved into high gear with proposals from towns and clubs. Muster parades and celebrations marking principal military battles of 200 years ago were staged throughout the county. In January 1976, the county Commissioners presented the "American Revolution Bicentennial Flag" that was flown in the courtyard year to JCHGS.

In 1978, new member dues were offered at \$1.00 to entice more people to join. The JCHGS held a birthday party for Glenn Shaffer, a former county treasurer and "Brookville's oldest man," at 100.

PA Museums Awards

PA Museums has announced that the Jefferson County Historical Society will be receiving a Special Achievement Institutional Award for the Scripture Rocks Heritage Park and an Individual Achievement Award for our Executive Director, Ken Burkett, for an exemplary project and outstanding leadership throughout the project.

Criteria for the institutional award includes providing an exemplary, successful cultural tourism program with marketing, media and educational components that results in community development and collaboration. The Individual Award is based

on quality of the leadership, professional skills and volunteer service (of which there were many hours!), impact of the project on the museum's outreach and reputation in the community, and it must be a well-managed project.

JCHS's Scripture Rocks project has provided an "outdoor museum" complete with an archaeological site for all of the community, county residents and visitors, increasing historical preservation awareness and tourism to our area, with over 9000 visitors in the first 6 months. Ken's leadership in maintaining a consistent core volunteer crew, his planning and implementation, and his perseverance in obtaining grants and orchestrating a capital campaign won him the Individual Award. He obtained the support of Jefferson County commissioners, legislators, outside museum personnel, PA Tourism Bureau personnel, corporate sponsors, private donors and many hours from volunteer members and from volunteers across the county.

These awards are important as they provide a means to promote the Jefferson County History Center and assist in obtaining future grants and funding opportunities. The awards provide public recognition of hard-working non-profit staff, board and volunteers from the community, and encourages maintenance of standards of excellence in our small town museum.

A huge thank you to community volunteers, businesses, clubs, gracious donors, board members, legislators and the visiting public at large who have made Scripture Rocks Heritage Park a huge success. We are not stopping here with these awards, as we have plans to obtain additional funding for a pavilion, parking lot surfacing and lighting, additional signage at archaeological site locations, docent training for group tours and educational events for schools, and last but not least, permanent restroom facilities. These plans are in addition to continual maintenance of trails and the park in general.

The PA Museum awards will be presented at a luncheon ceremony at the upcoming PA Museums annual statewide conference in Erie on March 26-28. Ken will also be presenting present a program during the conference, appropriately titled *Legacy on the Rocks* to discuss the pitfalls and successes of developing a park in a remote setting and how JCHC created an interesting way of interpreting and teaching local history by building the Scripture Rocks Heritage Park.

The PA Museums organization is made up of over 300 museum organizations from across Pennsylvania and annually recognizes outstanding leadership and organizational achievements.

The JCHS Board, staff, members, local press and community are invited to attend.

PA Museum's 2017 Annual Statewide Conference, *Challenges and Change*, is on March 26-28, Erie, PA. More information will be forthcoming regarding cost, location and registration. 
With open minds, they investigate historic buildings using modern equipment such as infrared meters, EVP recorders, K2 meters, voice recorders, and more. After compiling a

Upcoming Exhibits



The JCHC is hotter than ever, and we are all fired up to present our newest exhibit about Jefferson County's fire companies and emergency services from 1898 to the present day. To put this 3 gallery exhibition together, we have had an overwhelming response gathering equipment and memorabilia representing the twenty fire companies in the county and the special assistance from the Jefferson County Department of Emergency Services.

Gallery A will be the kids' interactive fire safety exhibit including a selfie station for Facebook with Fire Department and EMS props, learning games, rescue tunnel, and a 911 call center simulation compliments of Tracy Zents and the Jefferson County 911 Emergency Dispatch Center. It will also provide information and demonstrations of how adults can help educate kids on fire safety, CPR and First Aid, and what it takes to become a volunteer or professional in this exciting and important field.

Gallery B will showcase changes from 1970 to the present, and exhibit modern protective clothing, fire equipment, tools and development of EMS services.

Gallery C covers 1898-1970 complete with an original 1899 hose cart on loan from Lindsey Fire Department and other antique equipment--like a hose rope tool and old nozzles--and photos documenting the evolution of fire equipment through the years, actual firemen's gear, and some pretty cool memorabilia.

Curator's Corner

Our Success Stories

The arrival of a Christmas card and a Texas newspaper got me to thinking about the many interns who have passed through our doors.

Prior to the opening of the History Center, Duquesne University graduate Jennifer Landry catalogued the large Knapp collection of glass plate negatives. Jennifer became an archivist with the American Chemical Society in Philadelphia and then moved to Arlington, Texas, and the National Boy Scout Museum. Her Christmas card and the Texas newspaper sent by my sister told me of the future move of the National Boy Scout Museum to the Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico, so Jennifer will be seeking a new position.



Jennifer's work was funded in part by a grant from the Pennsylvania Humanities Council. Then about fifteen years ago as we were preparing to open the History Center, we worked with the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Clarion University Foundation. The interest generated from the \$100,000 initial investment from the NEH, Matson Lumber and Brookville Equipment, pay a graduate student to work about 20 hours each week with us.

In 2004-05 Matthew Mangarella assisted with the preparation of a large exhibit in the Parker Gallery that featured wars ending in 1865, 1945, and 1975. He did the newspaper research on those wars. He went on to work in the libraries at Penn State University.

Jessica DeWitt spent a summer with us (2007), "learning the ropes of archiving." She went on to earn an M.A. in History from the University of Rochester, after completing her thesis, "A Convergence of Recreational and Conservation Ideals: The Cook Forest State Park Campaign, 1910-1928." Today she lives in Saskatchewan, Canada, and is completing a PhD, studying provincial and state parks. She is the Social Media Editor for the Network in *Canadian History* and Environment and editor of Folklore: The Saskatchewan History and Folklore Society.

Caleb Kifer, our graduate assistant between 2008 and 2010, teaches social studies and English at Clarion-Limestone High School. He helped as we completed our major exhibit, *Living on the Land*, and with our educational programs.

Nathan Pearce, a technology expert, helped the History Center during 2010-2011 to develop our touch screens and the many street signs that inform visitors of Historic Brookville. Today he is the educational technology lead at the University of Pittsburgh.

Cara Stockdale learned of our intern program from Jennifer Landry and volunteered during the fall of 2012. She became our graduate assistant in 2013 and in 2015 was the JCHC Outreach Coordinator. She headed up a series of zombie-related events, and with Clarion professor Todd Pfannestiel, introduced county residents to paranormal activity.

In 2016, Alyssa Snyder, a strategic communications major, worked with us on marketing projects and the layout of the third edition of the *Jeffersonian Journal*. This January she returned as our graduate assistant.

This past fall, Tonya Shaffer, a library science major, worked with Judy Shirley to rearrange our research library and made sure our shelves were organized according to the standards of the Library of Congress. She worked with me on a wide variety of projects to learn how small organizations like ours function.

Those of us at the History Center are pleased that we can offer students in rural Pennsylvania the opportunity to learn in a first-class, but small, institution.


Escape Room: Escape from the Hangman!



The new furnace was (finally!) installed April 1979. Work committees formed and the museum was open in summer two afternoons per week, but closed in winter. Nineteen new members joined in 1979. JCHGS produced their first newsletter, *'The Jeffersonian,''* that year. The second floor exhibits were now extensive, offering views of the past.

In 1980, JCHGS was awarded a \$10,823 Special Project Grant from the Institute of Museum Services to help meet operating expenses. The Society was recognized by the PA Federation of Historical Societies for its innovative "miniwindow exhibits" on the museum porch. Dues increased to \$3.00. Annual dinner tickets were \$4.78 for ham and \$6.36 for stuffed chicken!

The Society launched a major publication project in 1981, A new county history showcasing family genealogies and photos free of charge, as well as histories of county businesses, schools, churches, organizations, and all the townships and boroughs. The Brockway and Punxsutawney historical societies were co-sponsors. The big news of 1982 was the publishing of this comprehensive historical and genealogical book, *Jefferson County Pennsylvania History 1982*. It sold at \$35 per copy. The following year in 1983, the Society received the Award of Merit from the PA Federation of Historical Societies for the caliber of the research. It was deemed invaluable, as the last history of the county, McKnight's *Pioneers and People*, was published in 1917.

In 1986, the only funds the Society received, other than member dues, was \$1000 annually from the County Commissioners. Dues were only \$5 for individuals and \$9 per family. Membership had fallen to 100, even though the museum had grown with many donated artifacts. Museum admission was still free.

The 1987 headline was "County Museum: Money, Members Needed." The story summarized the past 20 years about the growth of the museum and a plea for more members (then at 140) and volunteers. Another headline underscores the value of the little museum's treasures: "Abraham Lincoln Signature Is In Museum." Signed by Lincoln, it is the Civil War commission of our own Samuel Craig of the 105th Wildcat regiment fame.

In 1988, the Society was struggling and they requested the Commissioners to restore \$1500 in their 1989 budget for needed repairs.

In 1989, JCHGS and Historic Brookville Inc. received a PA Local History Grant of \$3000, which was used to catalogue their collection of over 1000 documents. A "Children's Century Room" and new exhibits were unveiled. The year didn't end so well, as December's headline "Out in the Cold" came true when the aging furnace gave up the ghost. Undaunted, the First Annual J Victorian Christmas Walking Tour was initiated.

1990 fundraising included selling "Memorial Bricks" for \$10, to be installed in the museum basement floor by Dennis Altman for his Eagle Scout project. The Kate Scott History was again reprinted and this time around sold for \$50.00.

1992 marked the Society's 25th Anniversary, celebrated at the annual dinner with a talk by PHMC, urging "collaboration among historical societies and museums for economic efficiency in face of diminishing resources." Very appropriate, since two state grants were applied for and one was rejected and the other reduced due to state cut-backs!

The Society planned a major expansion to the museum for 1992 with the addition of a climate-controlled archival storage facility estimated at \$20,000. The bequest from the Mildred Johnson estate in 1993 allowed the Society to begin construction of the museum archives building and also redecorate the interior of the museum.

Although membership was at its highest at 345 in 1995, Daisy Gilbert moved for a county membership drive, as only 121 of those 345 members resided in the county. The VFW, American Legion and JCHGS hosted a community WWII Commemorative exhibition, displaying artifacts of that war in every business window.
