#### ANNUAL MEETING & AWARDS DINNER

JCHS held its Annual Meeting, Dinner & Awards presentation on October 8, 2022 at the Pinecrest Country Club, Roseville.

The Lifetime Achievement Award was presented to E.M. "Jack" and Jean Parker in recognition of their exceptional service and significant contributions to the success of JCHS over many, many years. Mrs. Parker accepted the award, presented by Traci Zents, President and Kat Lyons, Operations for both herself and Jack Parker, Jr. who passed away in March of 2018. This is the  $2^{nd}$  year this award has been given. The Parkers were here for extensive remodeling of the historic Edelblute-Pearsall building into the History Center beginning 2001 through the Grand Opening in March 2004. The 1<sup>st</sup> floor "Living" on the Land" Gallery was established by Jack and Jean in honor of Jack's parents, E.M. Parker Sr., and



Genevieve (Fish) Parker. The pair went on to donate many artifacts and documents, chaired the Annual Giving Campaign in the past, and funded the Scripture Rocks Pavilion, dedicated summer 2017. A member since 2004, Jean became a Life Member in 2010. Their combined philanthropy continues.

The Arthur Altman Award was presented to Art and Jo Schrecongost, in recognition of their service to the JCHS Board and operation of the Bowdish Model RR & Miniatures Diorama. They have been volunteering on the Bowdish Crew since 2005 and became JCHS members in 2011. Art runs the trains using an iPad and explains to kids how he manages to run 3 trains at once and speed them up or slow them down. Jo passes out the Bowdish brochure and encourages kids to look for the list of animated people and creatures in the exhibit and find past and present miniature buildings. Every January, they take down the trains and track, clean them all, and make any needed repairs to the animations. *Continued on Page 3...*

They switch out buildings and people to give the exhibit a new look. Art is a confirmed train enthusiast and travels every year to a model train event in Lancaster County. If it wasn't for them (and fellow crew member Bill McCracken) we wouldn't still have the Bowdish Model RR & Miniatures Diorama Show!

The Kate M. Scott Award was presented to Dale Luthringer by Kat Lyons for his continuing contribution educating the public on the history of Cook Forest and Clear Creek State Parks of Jefferson County. Dale is the DCNR Environmental Education Specialist at both Parks since 1996.

He is no stranger to JCHC. In 2010, he led a guided walking tour of Cook Forest's Old Growth Forest Cathedral for a JCHS Summer Membership Day and became a JCHS member.

Dale can also tell you anything you want to know about the wildlife of these two parks and

where to spot them, from eagles to otters, from fish to waterfowl. His research and educational programming includes remnants of 1800s mill races, grist mills, sawmills, and tanneries along the Clarion River. If you go on his canoe/kayak floats, you will learn a lot of history! Dale is also one of our presenters for the 4<sup>th</sup> grade visit to Scripture Rocks Park each May, leading the tour on forest trees, past lumbering, current conservation practices, and park birds.

# The Program: SFC Army Retired Steve Appleby, Curator, Education & Programs Eldred WWII Museum, McKean County

After a wonderful dinner catered by Bo Lockwood of Red River Roadhouse of Clarion, a brief meeting and the awards presentations, the program for the evening commenced. SFC Army Retired Steve Appleby, Curator, Education & Programs at the Eldred WWII Museum, McKean County presented "The Greatest Generation: Teaching Youth about WWII." Steve is a prolific speaker and had the dinner crowd transfixed. A few older members who went through WWII were greatly moved – Bill McCracken spoke of his experiences at the end of Steve's presentation. Steve covered more recent wars as well—the Gulf War, Korea and Vietnam. He made it clear how these wars affected all of us – from the men and women in service at the time to the wives and families left behind here in the states. Several audience members were present who had served in these wars appreciated Steve's recognition of their service.

His presentation was accentuated by the many artifacts of war that he brought with him, from canteens to weaponry. He gave examples of how he responds to youth who feign no interest, with stories that put them in awe. A very moving presentation by a deeply committed man, we are proud to have him at our meeting and will bring him back in the future.





**MOONLITE DRIVE-IN THEATRE** Our local Drive-In presented a night of zombies and ghouls as a benefit for JCHC. This 1968 epic film was the first modern zombie film that set off the horror genre. The





film follows 7 people trapped in a rural farmhouse in western PA (sound familiar?), who are under assault by cannibalistic Zombies (ghouls who won't stay dead). Initially, the film industry and viewers were in shock.

However, a little bit of history: In 1999, the film was deemed "culturally, historically, or aesthetically significant" by the Library of Congress and preserved in the National Film Registry. In 2013, JCHC brought a screening of this film to Brookville at the Columbia Theatre, complete with screenwriter John Russo and producer Russ Streiner in person, along with a "Best Zombie" contest.

**EERIE TALES:** Eerie Tales returned this Halloween with six stories by Randy Bartley. Actors were volunteers and members of Brookville Community Theatre and the Clarion Players. "The Test" told of Victorian methods of testing a corpse. Without the widespread use of embalming, crude methods were used to test if the deceased was truly deceased. The undertaker was certainly surprised by the undead corpse.!

The story of the missing "Boy in the Box" found in a wooden chest in a barn overhead is still an unresolved mystery that remains unsolved.


In "Ghostbusters," two mischievous girls "borrowed" their father's ghost hunting equipment but found out ghost busting wasn't as easy as it looked.

At the Columbia Theater, "The Eternal Aria" act told the mysterious tale of the deceased singer, Miss Anastasia.

A little "skullduggery" was afoot by a famous French surgeon planning to do a bit of trepanning on a patient (drilling into the skull). The surgeon tried to start the operation a bit early on his patient but she was saved just in time by the local doctor.

The finale was the saga of Earle Sandt, Brookville's first pilot, whose fatal crash at the age of 25 was retold at the History Center by Eric Armstrong.



### VETERAN'S DAY FRIDAY NOVEMBER 11TH—SATURDAY NOVEMBER 12TH







# **JCHS Scripture Rocks Heritage Park News**

The Rockin It Guided Tours were a complete success this year. Our guides hosted up to 30 at a time who came to hear the Douglas Stahlman story.

The Pollinator-Pond Habitat is effectively complete this year except for some groundcovers we will be adding this late fall, pending weather, or early spring. Ken and Kat attended Centre County Historical Society's fall low cost plant sale late September to purchase some native herbaceous plants we didn't already have. Director and friend Mary Sorenson told us of free trees at a Boalsburg native plant arboretum, sponsored by the Chesapeake Bay Watershed Foundation. 
