JCHS is pleased to announce a newly acquired two-story facility known as the Blews Hall via a long term lease from the Brookville Borough. After renovations, this facility will soon house and preserve our archives, artifact collections and county courthouse records—currently totaling over 60,000 items—into one all-inclusive facility. This is a phenomenal opportunity and the timing couldn't be better, as our current storage areas are now at capacity!

This 1950s era building—vacant for years—needs exterior and interior repairs and renovations to accommodate our space needs and visitor and staff accessibility.

JCHC In the News



The Society for American Archaeology Honors JCHC Executive Director Kenneth Burkett

The SAA presents the Crabtree Award annually to an outstanding avocational archaeologist. Nominees should have made significant contributions to advance understandings of local, regional, or national archaeology through excavation, research, publication, site or collections preservation, collaboration with the professional community, and public outreach.

Kenneth Burkett was honored with the SAA's 2022 Crabtree Award at their Annual Meeting & Awards Ceremony on April 1, 2022 in Chicago. Recognized for hisoutstanding service to PA Archaeology, Ken is a Carnegie Museum of Natural History Field Associate and Society of Pennsylvania Archaeology (SPA) member since 1983.

Ken was bit with the archaeological bug at age 12 upon finding his first arrowhead. He later volunteered with several important local and regional site excavations. In 1975 at age 23, he made a sensational discovery of a Native American burial in Elk County dating to 1330 A.D., now housed at Carnegie. From 1976-1996, he excavated the significant Fishbasket complex of six Late Woodland Villages, which established a new cultural group in western PA. He received the 1983

SPA Archey Award for his outstanding contributions to PA archaeology. He helped start SPA North Fork Chapter 29, and is northwest PA's petroglyph expert for his work on the Parker's Landing site. He has authored an exceptional number of publications and book chapters, and co-authored the award-winning Scripture Rocks book. He currently leads SPA's efforts to include archaeology sites in the State Historical Marker Program. Ken also directed SPA North Fork Chapter 29's excavation of a Native American rockshelter within the award-winning Scripture Rocks Heritage Park.

Society PA Archaeology Honors Ken Burkett with Lifetime Achievement Award



This exemplary award is bestowed upon a professional or avocational archaeologist, who has an outstanding record of contributions to PA archaeology. A nominee must have (1) 20 years of outstanding service in support of PA archaeology, (2) been a member of the State SPA for 20 years and (3) be an exemplary supporter of SPA's mission.

The award was given at the SPA Annual Meeting's dinner banquet in Ligonier, April 9, 2022 and was a complete surprise to Ken. His long-time mentor, Dr. Stan Lance, retired Carnegie Museum Archaeologist, (who is

now 92), whom Ken worked with on a number of significant projects, nominated Ken for this award. Dr. Kurt Carr, Senior Curator of Archaeology at the PA State Museum, Dr. Sarah Neusius, IUP Anthropology Dept., Dr. John Nass, Calif. Univ. of PA Anthropology Dept. and Brian Fritz, M.S. and owner Quemahoning LLC, submitted letters in support of the nomination.

MR. THOMPSON, of Pennsylvania: Madam Speaker, I rise today to congratulate Kenneth Burkett, a Jefferson County resident, for receiving the Crabtree Award from the Society for American Archaeology.

This award is given annually to an outstanding avocational archaeologist in remembrance of Don Crabtree. Mr. Crabtree brought experimental archaeology to prominence.

Recipients of the Crabtree Award are archaeologists who have contributed to advance the understanding of local, regional, and national archaeology through excavation, research, publication, site preservation, or collections preservation, all in collaboration with the professional community or public outreach.

This award is well descrived for Kenneth, as he has spent his career conducting archaeological research and excavations in western Pennsylvania, focusing on the lifeways of prehistoric Native Americans who once lived in the Redbank Creek watershed.

Kenneth is currently the executive director of the Jefferson County History Center as well as a field associate with the Carnegie Museum of Natural History. He spends time working closely with the Society for Pennsylvania Archaeology 24th Chapter, located in North Fork.

Kenneth has a true passion for bringing our history to life and sharing the artifacts of the people who walked this Earth before us. Once again, I want to congratulate Kenneth on this well-deserved accomplishment.







Spring is Here and the Scripture Rocks Heritage Park officially opened April 1^{st.} Guided Walking Tours will occur at *1:00pm on the last Sunday of every month May through September.* Come hear the Douglas Stahlman story, learn about the park history from the Historians who created this park, and experience the Native American Rock Shelter.

A final planting in the Native Plant-Pollinator Pond Habitat will be completed this April-May with a small grant from Wild Ones

(wildones.org) for purchase of native seeds and plants. The grant is just under \$500 and will cover the remaining plants we need to complete the native plant-pollinator habitat.

We also host programs on Pollinator Ecology / Environmental Education. Presenters include JCHC Staff, Board members and professional educators. We extend this opportunity to all area schools, organizations, clubs and groups. We especially invite organizations representing disabled individuals, as we created an ADA accessible education staging area adjacent to the plantpollinator pond habitat for this specific purpose.

Attention Scout Leaders: We are also starting an extended Environmental program for Scouts so they can earn their Environmental Badges.

PA MUSEUMS 2022 Annual Statewide Museum Conference

VOSEUMS Presentation & Award. Two of JCHC's staff and a former Board member have been invited by PA Museums to make a presentation on the JCHS Scripture Rocks

Heritage Park's new Native Plant-Pollinator Pond Habitat and adjacent ADA Accessible Education Area. Kenneth Burkett, Executive Director; Kat Lyons, Operations Director and Chuck Williams of Williams Ecological, LLC and former Board member will co-equally present the slideshow. The presentation will focus on the planning, grant research and subsequent funding for the ADA area, and implementation of the project in 4 phases covering 2019, 2020 and early spring 2021. This all led up to JCHC hosting our first 4th grade class in May 2021 at the Park for an in-depth Environmental Education Day.

We created educational programs and accompanying materials—including rack cards of pollinators and pond life, a Plant-Pollinator Booklet (kudos to intern Alyssa Burkett) and Jr. Ranger booklet-for the kids. We also secured professional educators for the day. Our presentation at the conference is specifically targeted toward other History Centers and Museums interested in expanding from a solely indoor museum to an outdoor setting and developing an outdoor "exhibit" and educational opportunities.

We also received a 2022 Institutional Special Achievement Award from PA Museums for this project which we titled "Pollywogs & Pollinators: Creating an ADA Accessible Garden Landscape & Education Area." This is the Park's 9th Award from local, state and national organizations and museums!



The Conference, initially scheduled at the Heinz History Center, Pittsburgh, PA on April 24-26th became a virtual conference presented via ZOOM.





We can find historic photos for you from our archives as well. Article deadline is August 1st.






Carole Briggs' Historical Article on the construction of PA State Route 28 was recently published in the winter issue of *Western*

Pennsylvania History, a publication of the Heinz History Center. The article chronicles the story of some of the Black immigrants from the south who worked on a local part of the route. (SR28 extends from Pittsburgh area to Brockway and merges into U.S. Rte. 219).

In the early 1930s, a group of Black construction workers worked on SR28 in the Summerville area. When the Great Depression caused the company to fail and leave the area, 100 Black Americans were stranded. Some of the families, including the well-known Dock and Alice Harris family, subsequently settled in Summerville and became active community members.
